Evidence 9: Photograph of Russian Army Officers Taking Tea



Introduction

By banning alcohol at the outset of the war, the government hoped to maintain public order and avoid the drunken rioting that had accompanied the revolutionary upheaval of 1905-6. Prohibition came at considerable expense, however, since the sale of vodka accounted for nearly one-fourth of the government's total revenues in 1913. In this photograph, Russian officers gather around the samovar to drink tea.
